CHW Definition and discussion

What are Community Health Workers? Community Health Workers (CHW) are trusted members of the community and have a close understanding of the community they serve. CHWs serve as a link between the patient and health or social service agencies, working to improve health outcomes by improving access to services and quality of care.

Definition: A frontline public health worker who is a trusted member of, and/or has an unusually close understanding of, the community served. This trusting relationship enables the worker to serve as a liaison/link/intermediary between health/social services and the community to facilitate access to services and improve the quality and cultural competence of service delivery. A community health worker also builds individual and community capacity by increasing health knowledge and self-sufficiency through a range of activities such as outreach, community education, informal counseling, social support and advocacy. (Definition from American Public Health Association, 2015).





Common tasks a CHW does with a patient.

- Links patients to medical care.
- Attends medical appointments with patients and educates them on navigating the system. Also, advocates for them during appointments
- Helps them apply for benefits food stamps, Medicaid, health insurance, WIC, etc.
- Connects them to community resources.
- Teaches patients health literacy how to read prescriptions, how to ask the doctor questions, how to refill their medications, etc.
- Provides basic education around their medical condition.
- Perform home visits.
- Moves patients towards self-sufficiency teaching the patient the skills needed to become self sufficient
- Cultural mediator





How are they different to supervise than other health professionals?

Supervising CHWs:

- CHWs have a good understanding of the CHW role, workflow and internal processes.
- Individual supervisions (one on ones)
- Expectations, basic skills needed that CHWs might not have at the beginning and handholding.
- Audits
- As new CHWs are being hired, please consider providing guidance on the following items during supervision:
 - Resource activity: How to look up resources
 - Documentation
 - Assessing patients efficiently (feedback)
