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



#### REPRODUCTIVE AGED WOMEN BY COUNTY, 2022




Population of Women of Reproductive Age (15-50) per County, 2022

## BIRTH RATES AMONG WOMEN OF REPRODUCTIVE AGE BY COUNTY, 2022




Live Births per 1,000 Residents of Reproductive Age (15-50), 2022



#### **Licensed Facilities With Acute Care, Inpatient Beds, 2023**




#### **Facilities Offering Prenatal Services, 2023**





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



#### **Distance to Prenatal Services, 2023**





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# **Distance to Maternity Care**

#### **Facilities Offering Inpatient Obstetrical Services, 2023**






# Distance to Maternity Care Specialists

• 75% of Zip codes are further than 30 miles




#### Family Medicine Physicians by County, 2023



# **Family Medicine Coverage**

- 4.1 family medicine physicians per 10,000 residents in rural counties compared to 3.9 physicians per 10,000 residents in urban counties.
- This is the opposite of national data BUT right direction for KS coverage.
- Family medicine physicians provide full scope of care for low- to moderate- risk pregnancies


#### **OB/GYNs by County, 2023**



- 61.4% of counties do not have an OB/GYN
- There are only 330 licensed pediatricians in Kansas
- Only 92% of pediatric residency slots were filled in 2024


#### **Pediatricians by County, 2023**

#### **Certified Nurse Midwives by County, 2023**






# Certified Nurse Midwifery Coverage

- 81 Certified Nurse Midwives (CNMs) in the state of Kansas.
- CNMs have full practice authority in the state of Kansas.
- There are growing numbers of certified professional midwives and non-certified, lay midwives practicing in Kansas. Professional and Lay midwives are not included in the numbers.


#### **Anesthesiologists & CRNAs by County, 2023**



40% of counties have no anesthesia coverage and must utilize contracted coverage




#### **Registered Nurses by County, 2023**





# Registered Nursing Coverage

- Maternity care nursing is a specialized field that requires expertise in maternal-fetal assessment and care of the laboring and postpartum patient.
- RNs are likely to be the highest licensed member of the healthcare team on site 24/7/365 in rural facilities. Initial assessment and determination of care is likely made by the RN.



# **Medicaid Coverage**

- In Kansas in 2022, 41% of mothers had Medicaid coverage at birth.
- In KS, the Medicaid reimbursement rate for surgical or non-surgical delivery is approximately 70%.
- Vaginal birth after cesarean delivery is 61%




# **Challenges**

- Maternity care requires a specially trained interdisciplinary team of providers and nurses. Meeting the need requires costly contracts for anesthesia, nursing, respiratory therapy, radiology/sonography, and transport.
- Close to 30% of Zip codes in Kansas are more than 100 miles away from high-risk services.
- All levels of the system of care reflect significant stress
  - Most KS counties have ≤ 5 Family physicians.
  - Providing full OB services requires at least two physicians on call 24/7
- Ensuring the right <u>maternal level of care</u> is available at the right time requires significant planning and expertise.
  - 61.4% of KS counties does do not have an OB/GYN

# **Challenges**

- Rural Critical Access Hospitals are heavily dependent on cost-based <u>Medicare</u>-reimbursement models
- Rural hospitals offering obstetrical services are challenged with maintaining costly contracted services that are not covered with this model.
- Maximizing maternal health workforce
- Maximizing teleradiology with a regionalized plan for care/services



# **Policy Considerations**

- Promote collaborative health networks that enable coordinated regional systems for maternity care
  - Culturally relevant care
  - Transportation needs
  - Accommodations for those needing early and long-term care at regional & tertiary care facilities
- New reimbursement models for maternity care
  - 86% of KS hospitals experienced a loss of services in 2023
  - 63% are at risk of closing
  - 32% are a risk of immediate closure
  - Free-standing birthing centers are struggling due to low reimbursement from Medicaid and private insurers
- Need to utilize in-state teleradiology services linked to a plan for increasing levels of care.





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
