

VOTER TURNOUT IS INCONSISTENT, EVEN WITHOUT A PANDEMIC

- More than 40% of registered KS voters don't participate, or come out only for presidential elections.
- The people who do vote are older, whiter and wealthier than the population as a whole.
- Candidates and political parties have limited resources for talking to nonvoters, forming a low-information loop.
- It's easy for policy makers to ignore people who don't vote.



TRADITIONAL CAMPAIGN TACTICS ONLY GET US SO FAR





- Many of methods we use work on people who ALREADY VOTE, but have little impact on turnout. (forums, yard signs, texting, postcards)
- There's no silver bullet for increasing turnout.
 Barriers are vast and personal to people.
- It's becoming harder to connect with people through the methods that DO work: (door-to-door and phone banking)





RELATIONAL ORGANIZING WORKS!

People are much more likely to do something new if they're encouraged by someone (or an organization) they trust.

RELATIONSHIPS!!

They are the cornerstone of civic engagement.

"Relational organizing" substantially outperforms contact by strangers.



- Trusted messengers
- Built-in networks!
- Two-way interaction
- Social accountability
- Better contact rates


72% of the general population deem their spouse or partner most trustworthy for information around social issues, followed by:

- immediate family members (66%)
- medical professionals (60%)
- close friends (59%)
- and scientists (51%)

Local or community leaders are seen as the next most trustworthy:

- pastors/religious leaders (40%)
- teachers (39%)
- church members (32%)
- and local business owners (31%)

Americans no longer know who they should turn to for reliable information. In these highly political and often polarized times, who the message comes from is just as important—if not more—than what the specific content of the message is.



2022 WILL BE EXTRA CONFUSING FOR KS VOTERS

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Redistricting

The State legislature drew new maps after the 2020 census but they are being contested in court for racial gerrymandering. We won't know our new political districts until June.

Constitutional Amendment

Everyone will have a proposed constitutional amendment on their August 2nd ballot this year. If you are a new voter, this could be your first time seeing something like this! Here's what you need to know:

- All voters can participate including Unaffiliated and Independent voters.
- A vote NO preserves the right to an abortion in the Kansas Constitution, subject to current regulations.
- A vote YES removes the right to an abortion from the Kansas Constitution opening the door for a total abortion ban.





NEARLY 70% OF REGISTERED **KANSAS VOTERS WILL SKIP THE AUGUST 02 ELECTION THIS YEAR.**





The Kansas primary election on August 2 is a big one! ALL VOTERS, including Unaffiliated and Independent voters, will have an opportunity to vote on proposed changes to the Kansas constitution. Many voters also will choose their parties' candidates for the November election.

THE PROPOSED AMENDMENT ON THE AUGUST 2 BALLOT WILL IMPACT REPRODUCTIVE HEALTHCARE IN KANSAS. The state constitution currently protects a woman's right to make personal health decisions, including about abortion. A NO vote would keep those rights in the Kansas constitution. A YES vote would remove those rights.

AS A KANSAS VOTER...

1. Make *sure* you're registered to vote.

Check your existing registration, re-register if you've moved recently, or register to vote for the first time! Do it online before the July 12 deadline at: KSVotes.org.

2. Get ready to vote early.

It's free, easy, and safe to vote by mail in Kansas! Fill out an online request for an advance ballot at KSVotes.org.

3. Re an informed voter.

Go to KSBallot.org to learn more about what issues are on your ballot, the candidates, and the proposed constitutional amendment.



4. VOTE!

ADVANCE BALLOT?

Mail it back (we recommend before July 15!) Take it to a drop box location.

Find them at KSBallot.org.

Take it to a polling location, either early or on election day. Find these locations at KSBallot.org.



IN PERSON, EARLY? Want to vote before election day in person? Early voting locations will open by July 14 in many places. Check for locations and dates at KSBallot.org.



ON ELECTION DAY? Want to vote on the day itself? Polls are open until 7 pm on August 2. Find out where your polling location is at KSBallot.org.


VOTER TO VOTER OUR STRUCTURE

Relational organizing keeps things personal, and it's effective! Teams are built of friends, family members, and neighbors who talk to people they already know. You talk to your friends, and they talk to theirs, until everyone is voting.

















STATEWIDE TURNOUT COMPARED TO PEOPLE WE CONNECTED WITH











We launched Faith in Democracy in 2020 with United Methodist Health Ministry Fund.

- We had 41 teams (with a total of 177 volunteers) participate, and they connected with 1,885 voters.
- Nearly 50% of those people were not regular voters.
- 93% of the people Faith in Democracy teams talked to cast a ballot in 2020!
